



T'shuva: The Gift of New Beginnings

The month of Elul which immediately precedes Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur takes on the characteristic of a preparatory period that sets the mood for these Days of Awe. Our Sephardic brethren recite Selichot each morning during Chodesh Elul. While the Ashkenazic custom is more lenient here, we still blow the Shofar each morning and recite Psalm 27, a Psalm that speaks powerfully to the notion of a personal relationship

to God.

All these customs have the effect of awakening the attentive Jew to the Mitzvah of T'shuva – repentance –, a Mitzvah that is central to the celebration of Yom Kippur. The word “T'shuva” means return. T'shuva as a religious process constitutes an interior movement in the spirit of a human being in which one's thoughts become increasingly God-conscious and our intentionality is directed away from violations of both the Halacha and universal morality that underlies the Halacha. Even as we redirect ourselves away from these violations – a process known as *עזיבת החטא* – “the abandonment of sin”, we move toward a positive commitment and inner renewal known as *קבלה לעתיד* – “resolution for the future”. The resolution for the future is a resolution to place our intentionality at the service of God. That is why the Talmud tells us *גדולה תשובה שמנגעת עד כסא הכבוד* “Great is the power of T'shuva for its reach extends to God's throne”. This merely restates the positive goal of T'shuva which is to achieve mind – filling God – consciousness. The last verse of Psalm 27 captures this when it concludes with the exhortation *אל ד' חזק ויאמץ לבך וקוה אל ד'* – “Place your trust in God! Strengthen and energize your heart and place your trust in God.”

In Jewish mystical literature, the point of origin for T'shuva or return is also the point of origin for freedom, the point of origin for Torah, and the locus of the world to come that survives human mortality. To use your reflective powers, to “do T'shuva,” is identical with using your inner freedom to change your destiny. To return to God out of an exercise of freedom is to recover the spiritual purposes of the Torah. To throw your lot in with the Torah's purpose is to grasp a moral purpose that is immortal.





Elul

In Chodesh Elul, we begin the process of introspection. This process culminates on Yom Kippur. Whereas our Sephardic brethren recite Selichot throughout the entire month, our practice is to blow the Shofar at Shacharit and recite Psalm 27 at both Shacharit and Mincha for the month of Elul. We begin our Selichot recitation very early on the Sunday morning before Rosh Hashana.

The Hebrew letters for Elul: “Aleph, Lamed, Vov, Lamed,” are used by the Midrash to represent the famous verse in Shir Hashirim: “Ani L’Dodi V’Dodi Li,” — “I am my beloved and my beloved is mine.” The “beloved” represents G-d; thus, throughout Elul our introspection and T’shuva are designed to recover our love and reconciliation with G-d.
